Independent Study: Meeting times to be arranged

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Office Hours: Mondays 11-12, Wednesdays 2-4, and Thursdays 10:30-12

Course Description:

This course provides an opportunity for MFCC students to practice basic counseling skills in a supervised setting with pre-screened beneficiaries. The course consists of one or two hours per week meeting with beneficiaries at the Salvation Army Adult Rehabilitation center plus one hour per week of group supervision along with necessary administrative time.

Students must be concurrently enrolled in MF604 Counseling Couples, have completed Professional Ethics I and show evidence of liability insurance. Class size is limited to no more than eight students.

Objectives:

1. Students will practice theory consistent supportive couples counseling, focusing on

rapport building skills and utilizing the core conditions of genuineness, empathy, and unconditional positive regard.

2. Students will receive group supervision and gain a beginning understanding of the importance and uses of critical self-reflection, peer feedback, and clinical supervision.
3. Students will be introduced to appropriate file documentation and statistical recordkeeping.

Course Requirements:

This is primarily an experiential course and so has minimal readings. However, students are expected to be current in their assignments in MF 604 Counseling Couples. Students must complete a minimum of 12 hours of pre-practicum mentoring and 12 hours of supervision (including appropriate administrative time, charting, etc.). Students are also expected to complete a learning log listing eight hours of additional experience. At least three of those hours should be reading from either the recommended reading listed below or from readings approved by the instructor. Other appropriate learning activities could include attending an AI Anon meeting or attending a training at the Salvation Army or other appropriate workshop. The learning log will be graded pass/fail.

Student's grade will reflect an evaluation of their functioning as a couple's counselor including functioning within a professional context, functioning within the organizational context, effectively interacting with others, utilizing knowledge directed practice, showing an appropriate level of counseling skills, using supervision and peer feedback, integrating of theology and psychology, and demonstrating appropriate ethical behavior.
