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Course Description

SME provides participants with an opportunity for learning through experience in a congregation or agency, alongside a qualified supervisor. The SME program is individually tailored for each participant in order to provide a supervised ministry experience in the many dimensions of Christian ministry, using supervisors, lay mentoring teams, theological reflection groups, case study conferences, experience in ministry reports, and a variety of evaluative & assessment tools.

Course Objectives

The primary objective of IS 706 is increased readiness for service in the church & world. The purpose of SME includes growth in personal maturation, theological integration, character formation, and skill competence. The SME program seeks to accomplish this overall aim by means of the following six methods:

- Students will explore their vocational identity, calling, and ministry focus by assuming the role of servant-leaders in the setting of a congregation, agency, or school.
- Through this experience, students will develop pastoral imagination.
- Students will integrate theoretical and theological concepts with the practice of ministry through reflection in ministry, responding biblically to the issues & questions arising out of their ministry situations.
- Students will develop an operational theology that supports their praxis of ministry by integrating their understanding of theology with their own ministry experience.
- Students will enhance their competency in a wide variety of ministry skills, growing in attitudes essential for effective Christian ministry.

Students will express their faith in Jesus Christ, the church, and the world by serving as preachers, teachers, counselors, and encouragers. These are all occasions to confess faith in Jesus Christ.

Course Requirements

1. Completion of a **Supervised Ministry Experience Proposal**, signed by the student, the proposed supervisor (including his/her Social Security number), and submitted to the instructor. Proposals are due for each and every semester of SME even if you use the same supervisor for your entire SME experience. **Due: August 19, 2008.**
2. Participation in the **Case Study Conferences (August 19, 2008)**. Peer group case study reflection conferences are designed to help participants reflect theologically upon their own ministry experiences and actions. Students are expected to read *Slices of Ministry* and *How to Think Theologically* in advance of the conferences. Every student will bring a case study to the peer group for presentation and theological reflection. More information will be given in class.
3. Completion of a **Learning Covenant**. By means of the learning covenant, the participant identifies her/his ministry goals and objectives in three different growth areas - doing ("hands"), being ("heart"), and thinking ("head"). **Due: August 19, 2008.**
4. Completion of a self-referent **Case Study**. Each case study is a written description and analysis of a "slice" of the student's own ministry experience or action in ministry. The term "self-referent" means you are required to write a case study about your own ministry experience, not another person's. The case study method of teaching and learning is used as a tool for theological reflection in ministry with peers and faculty. **Due: August 19, 2008.**
5. Participation in ten **Supervisory Conferences**. The supervisory conferences represent a significant portion of the required 3-5 hours of reflection in ministry each week. Conferences (about one hour in length) are held between the supervisor and participant in order to keep focused on the purpose and goals of the participant's ministry and, most importantly, to do

theological reflection on the participant's ministry experience. Indicate participation in the Self-Evaluation.

6. Completion of the **Supervisor's Report/Evaluation**. At the conclusion of the Spring 2008 semester, the supervisor completes the Supervisor's Evaluation form, which must be signed by the student and then submitted to the SME Director. **Due: August 19, 2008.**
7. Completion of the participant's **Self-Evaluation**, including the **Issues in Evaluation** exercise. See the *SME Handbook* for first semester self-evaluation forms & pages 42-44 for issues in evaluation. **Due: August 19, 2008.**
8. **Enacting the Faith**. Reports of experience in leading and/or planning a:
 - Lord's Supper service
 - Christian Baptism
 - Wedding Ceremony
 - Funeral Service

Required Readings: James D. Berkley (Editor). *Leadership Handbook of Practical Theology. Volume One. Word & Worship*, pp. 339-498 (Available in the library). In addition to the above readings, students are expected to write 4 one-page descriptions of their experience in leading, planning & participating in each of these services in the context of their placement site.

MACM students must complete this assignment within two semesters.
Master of Divinity students must complete these events by SME 4.

9. **Resume/Curriculum Vitae**. Prepare a two or three page resume. Students are encouraged to design a resume format that reflects their own ministry style and goals. **Due: August 19, 2008.**
10. **First Year of Ministry Paper**. This may be an act of imagination for some of you. You are expected to anticipate your first year of ministry and indicate how you will serve in your new assignment. What do you hope to accomplish? What priorities do you anticipate? What goals will you set for yourself – personal? family? ministry? Carefully reflect as you write a three-page sketch of your first year in ministry. **Due: August 19, 2008.**
11. **Doctrinal Statement**. The completion of a doctrinal statement is a significant portion of SME 4. This purpose of this exercise is to assist students to complete a document that is often required for licensure or ordination by many denominations and para-church agencies. Contact the instructor to talk further about this assignment. **Due: August 19, 2008.**

Course Grading

The grade for the course is a letter grade. Late assignments will be accepted, but the grade will be reduced by 5% for each late day. Attendance at seminars and case conferences is expected. After all the written assignments are graded, your final grade may be adjusted down by as much as 20% for absenteeism, non-participation or negligence. The relative weight for course assignments will be as follows:

*a) To earn 1.5 Units of SME or Theological Field Education participants in ATS accredited seminaries are expected to complete 200 hours of ministry experience and reflection. b) Time allotment for journaling is based on a rate of 500 words per hour or 2 pages per hour. c) Reading time is based on 20 pages per hour. d) Participants receive graduate level credit for the reflection on ministry experience portion of SME, not the experience in ministry.
